While we do fund what is needed today, our focus is on how we can contribute to change for a better tomorrow.

Our small yet nimble team is passionate about generating the most momentum and impact possible in our focus areas. We've had an amazing collection of experts, advisers and friends help us to date, and appreciate all the advice and support given.

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## How we operate

As a proactive funder, we find partners and initiatives to support, working with others to do so. We have minimal paperwork, high trust, prioritise unrestricted giving and are agile (we make quick decisions, go where the needs are, and are constantly learning). We work with experts, other funders and partners, and explore ways to collaborate, co-fund, support and share. We're mindful of the power of collective action, the unique role that philanthropy can play to realise change, the value in taking risks and always 'do no harm'.

## We fund in two ways:

1. Give and Gos - providing immediate support, no ongoing relationship

2. Strategic partnerships - ongoing relationship, more focused on systems change, being a catalyst for change and generating momentum

Most of our giving to date have been 'Give and Gos' while we build relationships and develop our strategies for each of our focus areas.

# Meet some of our partners

## **Emergency Response**

In a time of enormous upheaval and uncertainty in 2021, Clare contributed funds to enable a range of organisations to activate the support and resources needed by their communities to navigate the social, economic and wellbeing impact of COVID-19.

From Iwi-lead initiatives like the Te Aroha Kanarahi Trust and Tukau Community Fund, to the Wellington City Mission and Wellington Soup Kitchen, and supporting Auckland Foundation's covid response fund, essential items like food, medical supplies and care packages were distributed to thousands of families.

Giving to Rainbow Youth's and Inside Out's programmes for at-risk rainbow youth in lockdown, and the Arts Foundation for artists who lost income rounded out Clare's COVID-19 response.

Beyond meeting urgent needs, some untagged 'Give and Gos' to support organisations working across our focus areas - Prima Volta, For the Love of Bees, Partners Porirua, Birthright, Bedtime Stories from Inside, Royal NZ Ballet's ballet in prison programme, Ace Lady Network, Nourished for Nil helped reduce their funding gaps that resulted from the impact of COVID-19.

In addition, Clare provided funds to aid World Vision's emergency response to help communities devastated by Cyclone Harold in Vanuatu and Cyclone Yasa in Fiji.

## **Community Finance**

The lack of affordable options has resulted in a desperate need for community housing, however funding for these projects remains a major barrier to getting new homes built.

Through partnerships with a range of Community Housing Providers, Community Finance activates new housing supply where it is most needed, as well as emergency, transitional, social and affordable housing projects.

In a united approach alongside the government, the building industry and the community housing sector, Community Finance takes impact investment by Clare, amongst other major investors, and unlocks access to warm, dry homes to improve standards of living and build stronger, more resilient people and communities.

## Te Kura-o-Wao

The uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic almost derailed former at-risk worker Keelan Poi's ambitions for Te Kura-o-Wao to have a positive impact on young people, through immersive and life-changing bush experiences on the idyllic East Coast.

Funding from Clare has enabled two key goals to be realised; specialist expert assistance to develop strategic plans, health & safety and governance procedures needed to apply for funding at higher levels, and the purchasing of two new cabins to accommodate programme guests.

# How are we tracking?

### ✓ Generating momentum, impact and solving barriers to change

Five of our donations related to systems change, including advocacy to build momentum for change. Two of the multi-year projects we are working on behind the scenes are designed to contribute solutions to long-standing issues with the view they could be scaled or lead to more solutions. A few of our 'Give and Gos' involved seed funding or enabled organisation to expand.

More broadly, we've been setting the scene for our work to come - working out what problems we want to be involved in and what solutions will have the most impact to generate real change. We know this will be a constant reassessment to ensure we continue to have impact.

## ✓ Releasing potential, unlocking possibilities and challenging the status quo

In addition to the above, we've incorporated learnings from the philanthropic sector into our approach to ensure we operate in a progressive way, which isn't yet the norm - this includes operating with high trust, being strategic, taking risks, funding advocacy and working collaboratively.

### ✓ Collective, collaborative and multifaceted initiatives based on bold ideas

We were driven to support the Gender Justice Collective, Te Mahere Whakauka and Community Finance for their collective, multifaceted and bold approaches to long-standing issues - gender equity, lack of hapu and whānau-led environmental and economic solutions, and housing shortage.

Internally, we've been working with a collection of experts and using codesign and collaborative processes to help identify our strategic focuses and projects across each of our areas, using the same question as our starting point: what is critical for change that Clare can get behind?

### ✓ A positive social and environmental impact of any organisations or groups we support

We are early in this journey. We've been conscious of who we've given to and reviewed the organisation with this lens - and lucky for us a lot of our partners operate with this in mind too. We are keen to work more on Clare's own environmental and social impact, and identify how we can influence positive change through our work.

Acting quickly to help today made up the bulk of donations this year - from emergency response to supporting organisations doing amazing things for our environment, women, youth wellbeing and oral health. As a new foundation, this helped us learn and build relationships to inform our strategic direction as well, including understanding how our 'Give and Gos' can be part of catalytic change.
